Possible Refuge Expansion: College Road Parcel		


The University of Alaska intends to dispose of a parcel **College Road Parcel** of land (appox. 118 acres) adjacent to Creamer's Field


Farmers Loop Road. The Conservation Fund has expressed interest in purchasing the parcel, for donation to the State of Alaska for the future expansion of Creamer's Field Migratory

Waterfowl Refuge. The parcel is generally considered to be wetlands with no constructed access and is zoned RA-5 (rural and agriculture district). The University intends to sell the College Road Parcel at or above fair market value. The University of Alaska is seeking public comment on the disposal plan. 

Field Sketches:

Field Sketch Presented by ADFG Biologist, Mark D. Ross Chickadees choose their Roosts Bold and boisterous, that's our most familiar feeder bird, the Black-capped Chickadee. We see and hear them scolding loudly, "chicka-dee-dee-dee"; complaining about people too close to their feeder or alerting flockmates to possible predators like hawks and owls. And they always seem to be in flocks too, especially in winter. But wintertime also brings out the little known solitary, secretive side of the Black-capped Chickadee: During winter chickadees roost alone. Even during the deepest, darkest, coldest night of winter, a chickadee seeks out no more warmth than the puff of its own feathers. For years I've seen Chickadees spend winter nights in nest boxes on the Farmhouse at Creamer's Field. More than 70 days of winter observation has revealed only one bird entering a box in the evening (right at dusk) and one bird exiting a box in the morning (right at dawn).




