



Happy Solstice, Friends!



Other Happenings in Fairbanks

The Christmas Bird Count is the longest-running community science bird project in US history. 2023 is the 124th national count and the 63rd count for the Fairbanks region. Creamer's Field makes up a portion

of the survey for the Fairbanks count area. Here on the refuge, the survey utilized 10 volunteers that counted 17 different bird species at Creamer's Field Migratory Waterfowl Refuge that included infrequent

Snow Buntings, a Bald Eagle, and Willow Ptarmigan! In total, the volunteers covered nearly 88 miles of trails and roads by foot, car, and snow machine.
