

Other Happenings in Fairbanks Interior Alaska Bank Swallows: Where Do They Go? February 5, 2024 at 7:00 PM | Carlson Center Pioneer Room Presented by Arctic Audubon Like many birds that feed on insects, our smallest swallow, the Bank Swallow (Riparia riparia) is experiencing steep decline. To understand variable population trends across their breeding range, 890 birds have been radio tagged across Canada and Alaska. In this talk, Eva Allaby, Wildlife Technician with Alaska Department of Fish and Game will discuss Bank Swallow ecology, where Bank Swallows can be spotted around Fairbanks, and how modern tracking technologies help scientists monitor small bird migration and movement. As North America continues to experience massive decline in breeding bird populations, this research represents initial steps towards informing conservation

actions to reverse decline. Eva Allaby has been a Wildlife Technician with the Alaska Department

of Fish and Game since 2015. She has been working on many projects

over the course of her career but has mostly been concerned with their Olive-sided flycatcher and Bank Swallows programs. Eva has a

master's degree in soil invertebrates, primarily land snails, from the Masaryk University in the Czech Republic.


