









Friends of Creamer's Field is a community-based 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization (Tax ID# 92-0137107) founded in 1991 to provide educational opportunities and family programs at Creamer's Field Migratory Waterfowl Refuge. The refuge stretches across 2,500 acres of fields, woods, and wetlands in the Fairbanks North Star Borough. The original Creamer family farmhouse (circa 1908) sits on the property and serves as our headquarters and features interpretive exhibits on migratory birds and on the historic dairy complex.

Working collaboratively with Alaska Department of Fish & Game (ADF&G) and other community partners, Friends of Creamer's Field aims to "inspire environmental stewardship and lifelong learning through experience, awareness, appreciation, and conservation of the natural and historic resources of Creamer's Field Migratory Waterfowl Refuge." Without the dedication and commitment of our 100+ active volunteers, we could not begin to accomplish this mission. Volunteers assist with programs & events, are trained to lead guided nature walks on the Refuge, and work as Hosts in the Farmhouse Visitor Center.


